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




School Plans




Anti-Racism

Nature-Based Indigenous Mentorship

- Using Indigenous Ways of Knowing and nature-based practices to support the promotion and enhancement of positive mental health.
- Students self-reported that they felt more connected to one another and to their community through this cultural focus.
- Strong partnership between community (Human Nature Counselling), Indigenous Education and Inclusive Education.



Bayside Canoe Club

- Canoe Club is a group that was formed from the work at Bayside connected to Truth and Reconciliation.
- It is a chance for Indigenous students to be leaders and teachers of their Non- Indigenous peers and allow all of them to connect to the land and the water.



- It creates opportunities for healing and wellness through teachings.
- By locating the club on Tsartlip and Tsawout reserves, deeper more connected relationships with our community partners can evolve.
- Approximately 56 students participate in the club.


IT RefreshED

- Laptops: 400 iPads: 150
- Projector Installs: 42
- Wiring upgrade at Claremont
- 83 Classroom iPads rolled out total
- Mobile Classrooms for French (iPad, laptop)
- Inclusive Education Refresh Program bringing laptops and iPads to students
- 5854 / 6028 tickets closed; approximately 33.5 tickets / day
- Inflationary costs as well as shipping and product delays continue to influence our ability to update infrastructure and end-user technologies.

- New School Sites are built, and just waiting on a few final approvals
- We will continue to work with staff over the next year so that they can learn how to update the sites independently

CDC Replacement
