BCSTA COVID-19 Working Group Survey Impact on students 1. Your school district School District No. 63 (Saanich) 2. How is your district addressing the following issues, and how can BCSTA support you? Social isolation / youth mental health school counsellors and case managers are reaching out to vulnerable students and their families including those accessing remote learning. We are building dapacity in staff focusing on trauma sensitive approach, strategies for anxiety, and mental health literacy. We are connecting with community agencies to support families. Food insecurity Schools are supporting those in need within their buildings. We were successful in receiving a grant through Victoria Rapid Relief and will be supporting families with food insecurity using these funds. School based supports for vulnerable students / priority learners (i.e. counselling, student support services.) Case management and counselling services are continuing, including for those students learning remotely. School teams are identifying students with vulnerabilities and ensuring supports are in place. Digital inequality to support families accessing remote learning, the district has a technology loan program for any families that requests assistance. 3. 19. How can BCSTA support or advocate for your district's international program?
The financial impact in our district is approximately \$3 million (4%), which is significant. A related issue is the method by which the ministry determined the Classroom Enhancement Fund (CEF), which in effect assumed districts would continue to fund 2016/17 staffing levels (as a baseline) even though, in many districts, enhanced staffing levels were paid for using international program profits. Without an increase to historical international program revenues in 2021/22, the ministry will need to revisit CEF allocations to ensure the language restored in the ministry's MOA is actually funded.
