North Saanich

- North Saanich hosted Creatures of Habitat for a day of invasive species removal.

Bayside

■ The Coastal Jam was a huge success, thanks to the incredible efforts of the Bayside Indigenous Leadership team. The event featured over 20 talented drummers and 80 vibrant dancers, creating an unforgettable atmosphere. We were thrilled to welcome over 200 family members of our WSÁNEĆ students, who came together to celebrate WSÁNEĆ culture. Additionally, funds were raised for a beautiful art piece by Chaz Elliot, which will be created by the leadership students with Chaz for the cultural room. A larger Coastal Jam will be held in the new year and inviting the entire Brentwood Community. The Coastal Jam truly showcased the strength and unity of our community.



Prospect Lake

- The annual Remembrance Day Assembly was held at Prospect Lake. We were pleased to welcome Lieutenant Commander Heather MacDonald, Royal Canadian Navy, Trustee VanWell, Constable Dion Bertwhistle, Saanich police liaison officer, and retired teacher Mr. Chris Bocking to play his bugle for The Last Post. A highlight of the ceremony was the honouring of Indigenous veterans with cedar wreaths handmade by Prospect Lake students with the support of Bailey Philips, Indigenous Support Liaison.
- Guest speakers Gina Martin and Vanessa Pettinger from the organization Diverse Abilities presented to the intermediate classes, helping to foster a deeper understanding of inclusion, diversity, equity, and accessibility. They educated students on the best ways to assist, interact, and communicate with persons with disabilities. They discussed apparent and non-apparent disabilities and helped students with appropriate language and tools through an interactive, engaging, and hands-on presentation.

Indigenous Education

Members of the WSÁNEĆ community filmed an upcoming educational documentary about WSÁNEĆ culture, told through the cycles of the WSÁNEĆ moons. The finished film will be made available on the Live It Earth website, where it can be seen by Saanich students and learners from around BC. The team arrived at the start of PEKELÁNEW (the moon that turns the leaves white) and began filming at Goldstream, where Indigenous students from Brentwood, KELSET and Bayside fished for salmon. The students were guided by Elders and other community members. The fish were taken back to Bayside, where it was prepared and smoked in the onsite smokehouse.

A key component of the project is a student workshop. Four secondary students from Stelly's picked up cameras and shadowed the crew as they filmed Elders talking about traditional cultural practices, such as reef net fishing, hunting, and longhouse, as well as how some of those practices still take place today. Filming has taken place in all four communities. This work is funded by a grant received by the Indigenous Education Department, and has been facilitated by teacher leader Darcy McNee, as well as Indigenous Support Liaisons, Muriel Morris, Landon Underwood, and Ambrose Underwood. The documentary is expected to be completed in the spring of 2025, around the time of SXÁNEŁ (the bullhead moon.)
