About the Saanich School District

The Saanich School District serves close to 8,000 student FTE in:

- 16 schools including the South Island Distance Education School (SIDES), and the Individual Learning Centre (ILC).
- Children's Development Center
- Saanich International Student Program

How School District Budgeting Works

School Boards adopt two budgets for each fiscal year:

- A preliminary budget is adopted before the end of June for the following fiscal year based on forecasted enrolment; and
- An amended budget is adopted before February reflecting actual fall enrolment and funding.
- The budget consultation process informs decisions regarding priorities for both the preliminary and amended budgets, and future budget planning.

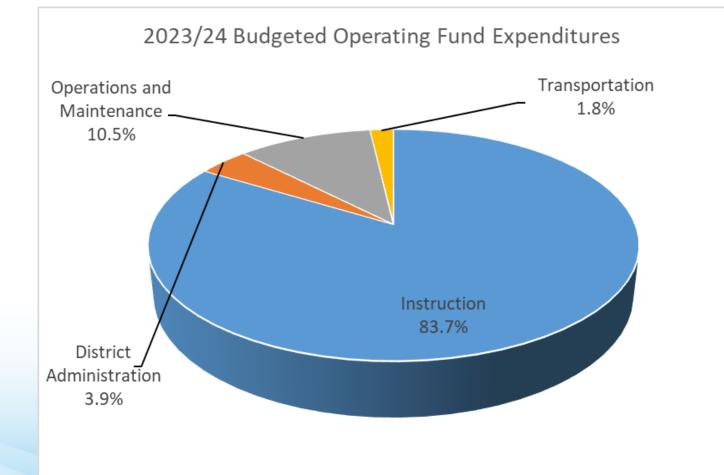


2023/24 Budgeted Operating Revenues

Revenue Source	\$ millions	% of total
Provincial Grants	\$84.4	87.0%
Tuition (international program)	\$4.3	4.4%
Direct funding from First Nations	\$3.9	4.0%
Homestay fees (international program)	\$2.6	2.7%
Other Revenues	\$1.8	1.9%
Total	\$97.0	100.0%

The Context for Budget 2024/25

- Unfunded Inflationary Pressures
- > 2024/25 Budget Pressure
- > Strategic Priorities

Unfunded Inflationary Pressures

- 2024/25 funding rate adjustments do not fully cover annual inflation (only reflects annual wage inflation).
- Funding formula disproportionately leveraged to enrolment change – disadvantages school districts that are not growing fast enough
- Increases to targeted funding in recent years cannot be used to address chronic underfunding of annual inflation impacting core K-12 programs
- A balanced budget can only be maintained longer term through continual program reductions

Unfunded Inflationary Pressures, cont.

- Impacts of unfunded inflation:
 - Technology Plan
 - Reduction in the purchasing power of school and departmental budgets
 - Budget reductions
- Board Advocacy focused on inflationary cost pressures



2024/25 Projected Budget Pressure

Net funding growth	(763,224)
Medical/Dental plan premium escalation	585,168
Canada Pension Plan (CPP) premium escalation	141,023
Forecasted increase to average Teacher wage	300,000
Technology plan budget shortfall (inflation)	500,000
Unavoidable service and supply inflation	160,000
Total Unfunded Inflationary Pressure	922,967

Other Budget Priorities:

Balancing Budget 2024/25

- Limited budget flexibility limited opportunities for administrative cost savings
- Program areas where budget reductions possible:
 - Instructional staff in excess of contract and legislative requirements
 - Daytime custodial support in elementary schools
 - Technology plan deliverables (by not fully funding plan)
 - Service and supply allocations to schools for program priorities
 - Non-core programs: transportation, crossing guards, strong start programs



Balancing Budget 2024/25

> Actual budget pressure may be lower than forecast

- 2024/25 Contingency reserve balance estimated to be \$2.9 million (or 2.5% of budgeted revenues)
- Contingency reserve could be used to fund budget shortfall to defer reductions pending resolution of budget uncertainty.
- Need to balance with increased budget risk that results from using contingency reserve to fund continuing expenditures
